BIG IDEA

TALK IT OVER

- What does it mean that we are God's "Plan A"? What is your identity and how do you stand in it?
- What "gates" have you been able to kick down through the power of Jesus' victory on the cross? What gate do you need to break through in this season of strife?
- What excuses do people use today for not sharing Jesus with others? How are you focusing on those who are not yet part of the family?

APPLICATION IDEAS

- Make a commitment to accept the personal responsibility, develop a personal relationship, share your personal story, and give a personal invitation.

PRAYER FOCUS
