BIG IDEA

Your attitude determines your altitude in life. Attitude is a learned way of thinking that results in behavior. Attitude is by choice, not by chance. Pastor Daniel explains how, as citizens of a Spiritual Kingdom, we can choose to live with attitudes of humility, obedience, endurance, and praise.

TALK IT OVER

Choose questions that keep the discussion moving. No need to discuss every question.

- Why does our attitude determine our altitude in life? How does our focus determine our attitude?
- What does it mean to consider others more important than yourself? How does humility create unity?
- How important is our obedience to God? How can we develop an attitude where we respond to any situation with obedience to God's direction?
- What does it mean to have an attitude of endurance? What challenges can attack our attitude of endurance?
 How do we overcome these challenges?
- How often do you hear complaints and arguments in a day? How does an attitude of praise keep us from complaining or arguing? How will you (and God through you) appear to others when you live with an attitude of praise?

APPLICATION IDEAS

- 1. Summarize each of the attitudes discussed: humility, obedience, endurance, and praise.
- 2. Have each person write down the attitude(s) they choose to change starting today.
- 3. Have them write down the first step(s) they are going to take to change their thinking in that area.
- 4. Discuss the impact your group could have when your behaviors change due to the attitude choices just made.
